Autumn & Halloween Vocabulary

This month, we're introducing some fun and spooky words that are perfect for the autumn and Halloween season. Check out the list below and try to use them in your conversations and writing!

- Crisp (adjective): Fresh and cool, used to describe autumn weather.
 - **Example:** The crisp air of October makes me want to go for a walk in the park.
- Harvest (noun): The time when crops are gathered from the fields.
 - **Example:** Farmers are busy with the harvest during autumn.
- Spooky (adjective): Strange and frightening, often associated with Halloween.
 - **Example:** We told spooky stories around the campfire on Halloween night.
- Pumpkin (noun): A large, round vegetable, typically orange, used in Halloween decorations and recipes.
 - **Example:** We carved a scary face into the pumpkin for Halloween.

- **Costume (noun):** Clothes worn to look like someone or something else, often worn during Halloween.
 - **Example**: I'm going to wear a witch costume this Halloween!

- **Jack-o'-lantern (noun):** A carved pumpkin, usually with a face, lit up by a candle inside, traditionally made for Halloween.

- **Example:** The glowing jack-o'-lantern on our porch looks so spooky at night.
- **Superstition (noun):** A belief in supernatural influences, often leading to rituals or traditions.
 - **Example:** There's a superstition that seeing a black cat on Halloween brings bad luck.

- Haunted (adjective): Inhabited or visited by ghosts.

• **Example**: They say that old mansion is haunted, but no one dares to go inside!

- **Trick-or-treat (phrase):** A Halloween activity where children dress up in costumes and go door-to-door asking for candy.

- Example: The kids are excited to go trick-or-treating this year!
- **Eerie (adjective):** Strange and frightening.
 - **Example:** An eerie silence filled the forest just before the storm hit.

Did you know?

In the UK and Ireland, pumpkins weren't always used for carving jack-o'-lanterns. The tradition originally involved turnips or potatoes! When immigrants from these countries brought the custom to the United States, they found that pumpkins—native to America—were much easier to carve, and that's how pumpkins became the Halloween carving tradition we know today.
